Business center eyed for Coldenham

Plans for a business center next to the Colden Mansion Ruins have been presented to the Town of Montgomery Planning Board.

Jesse Cokeley, principal at Colliers Engineering & Design, described the proposed 68,000 square-foot building as "bulk compliant flex space" at the northwest corner of Stone Castle Road and Route 17K, opposite the ruins. The property, he said, is currently vacant and mostly wooded.

The proposed building will have four loading docks with two driveways, one off 17K and the other offering egress onto Stone Castle Road. The configuration allows for multiple tenants, Cokeley said.

The proposed structure is being built on speculation, with no tenants yet secured.

"It's attractive space on the market because of its flexibility," Cokeley said.

Planning Board members had some concerns.

Cheri Zahakos wondered if there

VC approves inter-municipal agreements

The Valley Central Board of Education voted unanimously on Wednesday, August 10, to approve inter-municipal agreements which would move ahead a security plan to have police officers as school resource officers stationed in every school building when the school year begins this September.

"I believe this will increase the security and safety of our students and staff in our schools," expressed Board of Education President Joseph Bond.

Earlier last week, the District approved the appointment of Stephen Ragni as Director of Security for the district, effective August 9. Ragni, a Marine Veteran, has been a member of the Town of Montgomery Police Department since 2011. He also has 12

years of experience with the FBI, 20 years with the Town of Haverstraw Police and a stint in the security detail of the U.S. Naval Headquarters in London.

In addition, the District approved Nancy Fitzsimmons as the Social Emotional Support Specialist. She has experience in the Department

Special election to fill Ulster seat

A special election for the NY-19th Congressional seat is scheduled for Tuesday, August 23 between Democrat Pat Ryan and Republican Marc Molinaro. The winner will serve out the remaining four months of Rep. Antonio Delgado's term, who was tapped by NY Gov. Kathy Hochul to serve as her Lieutenant Governor.

The election next week is being held under the current district boundary lines while the election on November 8 will be in a newly drawn district. Molinaro is running the 19th district in both the Special and November elections while Ryan is running for the NY-19th in the special election and come November he will be running in the redrawn NY-18th district.

Democrat Pat Ryan is currently serving as the Ulster County Executive, a position he has held since 2019. He is a fifth-generation Ulster County resident, and after graduating from Kingston High School he attended West Point and later served two tours of duty in Iraq as an Army Intelligence Officer. After leaving the military, he founded a small technology company in the county, which he grew to more than 150 employees. Pat lives in Gardiner with his wife, Rebecca and their two sons, Theo and Cameron.

Ryan has made defending a woman's right to choose a focus of his campaign, with his signs pointing out that 'choice is on the ballot.' He has promised to work to pass common sense gun policies to protect children; make investments in the district's communities by expanding broadband and by lowering housing costs; suspend the gas tax and hold corporations accountable for price gouging and is willing to take on corporate polluters in order to protect our water and clean air.

Ryan said we need to invest in our roads and bridges, expand rail, help workers with training and technology so they can compete for good jobs, revitalize small businesses by reducing regulatory burdens while improving access to capital; ensure that equal work means equal pay regardless of gender; and move forward to expand equal rights for LGBTQ communities, especially in healthcare, housing, employment and

education. He promises to embrace clean energy alternatives to help reduce our dependence on fossil fuels while creating good jobs in the district. He firmly believes that in the process we should end subsidies to fossil fuel companies.

Ryan said the economy is not favoring the working class and blames corporations for helping themselves to more than their fair share. He would work toward a 'people-centered' economy that provides child care, affordable housing and more investment in the district's infrastructure.

Republican Marc Molinaro is in his third term as the County Executive of Dutchess County. He was a former Mayor of Tivoli, NY and at the age of 19 was the youngest mayor in the United States. He was re-elected to this position five times and has also served in the Dutchess County Legislature. In 2006 he was elected to the New York State Assembly, representing the 103rd district and served until 2011.

Molinaro is married to Corinne Adams and together with their two children they reside in Red Hook, NY. He also has two children with his first wife.

Molinaro said he has worked hard to ensure that taxpayers keep more of their hard earned money while receiving the highest quality services.

"I will take the same mentality to Washington and fight to reduce the burden on the people of upstate. We must ease the impact of historic

inflation, allow businesses to better invest in growth and high-paying jobs, unlock the productive capacity of the United States economy and open the door to opportunity for all Americans," he said.

As County Executive, Molinaro delivered his eighth straight property tax reduction, cutting the tax levy by \$5.5 million – the largest tax cut in County history – and the seventh consecutive property tax rate decrease for homeowners and businesses, cutting the rate by 10 percent, all without reducing services to residents.

Molinaro led a fiscal revival by turning the \$40 million budget gap Dutchess County Government faced when he began his tenure, into a \$60 million fund balance entering 2022.

Under Molinaro's leadership, Dutchess County spends 28 percent less per capita than the statewide county average; has a tax levy that is 27 percent lower per capita than the statewide county average; and has outstanding debt that is 50 percent lower per capita than the statewide county average.

Molinaro opposes bans on assault rifles and is personally against abortion. He initially considered the constitutional right to abortion settled law but now believes it is up to the states. He has indicated that he will vote against any federal law that would ensure abortion access nationwide and is also on record opposing a nationwide ban.

Matthew Mackey seeks Assembly seat

Seeking to become the first non-binary individual to be elected to the New York State Legislature, Matthew Mackey is a candidate for the 101st Assembly seat.

If elected, Mackey would replace incumbent Brian Miller (R,I,C-New Hartford) who would lose the Wallkill Valley and surrounding communities in the recent redistricting process. Miller is running for re-election in the new 122nd Assembly district, which includes parts of Oneida, Herkimer, Madison and Otsego Counties.

"I am humbled and overjoyed to accept the endorsements of the Ulster and Orange County Democratic Committees, the Working Families Party, the National Association of Social Workers- NYS Chapter, and the Town of Montgomery Democratic Committees," Mackey said. "Thank you so much for your recognition and support of our campaign to finally give a voice to District 101. For too long this District has been represented by individuals who haven't brought meaningful change for families in over a decade. That changes here and now. Today, we take the step together to make Assembly District 101 and New York State a place that works for everyone. Thank you for your support and let's get out there and do this!"

He has also picked up endorsements from the Town of Shawangunk Democratic Committee and former State Senator Jen Metzger

Montgomery Supervisor Brian Maher is the general election, is seeking to serve in the 101st Assembly District which includes the Orange County Towns of Montgomery, Crawford and Hamptonburgh, and the Ulster County Towns of Shawangunk and Wawarsing. The district also includes the Orange County town of Blooming Grove and parts of the Town of Goshen. The district then flows north to include parts of Ulster County (Town of

Wawarsing, Town of Rochester, Town of Denning, Town of Hardenburgh), Sullivan County (Town of Neversink), Delaware County (Town of Andes, Town of Hamden, Town of Franklin), Otsego County (Town of Otego, Town of Laurens, Town of Morris, Town of Pittsfield, Town of Edmeston) and Madison County (Town of Brookfield).

"For the last decade, District 101 has been one of the most gerrymandered districts in New York State, never allowing for the full representation of the residents who live here and having a representative effectively be able to advocate for the district," Mackey said.

Mackey, who uses the pronouns Xe, Xem and Xis, is a native of Poughkeepsie. Xe spent time in both Bloomingburg and a quaint little apple farm called Mackey Farms in Milton, where xis grandfather and uncle grew apples and raised goats and other livestock. According to Xis bio, Xe learned basic American sign language since both parents are deaf.

In 4th grade, Mackey won a disability awareness art contest for New York State and advocated for sign language interpreters at school functions. As a teenager, Matthew discovered xis love of music and theater. Xe attended SUNY Fredonia before transferring to Marymount Manhattan College (MMC) in 2007 to pursue a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Theater, minoring in Musical Theater.

Matthew has been an advocate for the LGBTQ+ community since xe

was an undergraduate at Marymount Manhattan College. In fact, xe created the first LGBTQ+ student organization on Marymount's campus in 2008. The following year, xe helped organize Marymount students to attend the National Equality March in Washington, D.C.

In 2011, Matthew petitioned on behalf of a binational same-sex married couple facing deportation. Xe was able to garner more than 20,000 signatures, and the petition was sent to President Barack Obama. They were able to win the fight, and the couple was allowed to remain in the country.

Xe worked in different patient representative positions before becoming an adviser for families who have children with special needs. Xe advocated on their behalf to insurance companies, providers and billing companies. Aside from being a family adviser, Mackey also volunteered for organizations, animal sanctuaries, food pantries and LGBTQ+ community centers.

Mackey said xe became politically active following the 2016 elections and decided to pursue a master's degree in social work from Adelphi University, which xe will finish in 2022.

According to xis website, Mackey prides xemself on being a drag activist (Drag Queen Activist), whose drag persona is Carbie Wantaciao. Xe helps make changes in the LGBTQ+ community one performance at a time.

Dunkin Donuts plans pose traffic concerns

While a proposed new Dunkin Donuts at the intersection of Route 208 and Goodwill Road has local officials worried about the volume of traffic it might add, so too is there concern for the place next door that the fast-food chain will vacate once the new place is built.

Dunkin Donuts representatives returned to the Town of Montgomery Planning Board last week for the continuation of their public hearing. They are seeking site plan approval to build a new larger restaurant at the now vacant lot next to their existing restaurant on Route 208. While they have a say in the approval of the proposed new site in front of the Holiday Inn Express that will exit onto Goodwill Road, they may not have any control over what goes into the existing Dunkin Donuts.

"Traffic's been an issue there," said Planning Board Chairman Fred Reichle. "There's parking on



the shoulder - traffic in and traffic out. If another similar type business comes in there, the planning board may not see it. It could be the discretion of the building department."

Planning Board Member Cheri Zahakos had an additional concern. Traffic from the planned Veteran Senior Housing Development on Hawking Drive will also flow onto Goodwill Road, adding to the traffic.

The town board recently created a floating zone for a proposed 8-unit apartment complex to be built behind the Montgomery Shop Rite. The development still awaits planning board approval.

Regarding Dunkin Donuts, Reichle said he would like to hear from the New York State Department of Transportation (DOT) before any decision is made on the site plan application.

Jay Samuelson of Engineering Properties, representing Dunkin Donuts, reminded the board that Goodwill Road was widened a few years ago to accommodate the Holiday Inn Express.

In the meantime, though, the planning board reviewed the proposed color scheme for the new project and agreed to await a DOT recommendation.

The hearing was held open and will resume on August 29.

Gardiner Councilwoman wants town to buy a hybrid

Gardiner Town Board member Carol Richman can't understand why the Town Board couldn't wait to purchase a more environmentally-friendly vehicle for the building department rather than approving the purchase of a gas-powered Jeep Grand Cherokee at its Aug. 9 meeting.

The Town Board voted 4-1 to buy the 2015 vehicle for \$20,000 from a private citizen with Richman casting the lone dissenting vote. The vehicle, which had just one owner and had logged 69,000 miles, could be used by town employees in other departments, too.

Supervisor Marybeth Majestic advocated for the purchase of the vehicle, calling it a "wise investment" for the town and noting that the vehicle could come out of American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds.

During the meeting, Majestic said chronic staffing issues in the town building department could be solved by adding a new vehicle for the department.

"It's come to my attention that to kind of sweeten the pot for the deal for somebody to work for the town it would be beneficial if they didn't have to use their own vehicles," she said. "Using their own vehicle (also) opens us (the town) up for liability."

Majestic said Town Highway Superintendent Brian Sticia recommended the vehicle and said it was in good condition.

"This is the second one," Majestic said. "The first one got vetoed on because it was a big truck that we really did not need."

Majestic said the new town vehicle could use gas from the town highway department's supply, thus eliminating taxes for gas purchased at local pumps.

Richman thought a better option would be to purchase a hybrid vehicle. During the meeting, she suggested it would send a wrong message to purchase a gas-powered vehicle after the town had become a Climate Smart Community.

"We're in a town where we have Climate Smart that we're advocating for," she said. "We should set a standard here."

Richman said the day after the board meeting that she wished she had been more forceful in her opposition to the vehicle purchase.

"I focused on the issue of purchasing a gas-guzzling large truck which is unnecessary for the job," Richman said. "Perhaps I did not present it with enough force. I could see I was the sole opponent of this purchase, thus I backed off."

Richman also opposed the board's decision to waive the town's procurement policy so they could buy the vehicle without delay.

According to Chapter 48 of the Town of Gardiner's Procurement Policy, three written quotes are required for purchase contracts from \$4,000 to \$20,000.

"It's even more reprehensible to suspend our procurement policy to not do comparison shopping to quickly purchase a non-hybrid, non-electric vehicle," Richman said.

Richman was not convinced that purchasing a new vehicle would be an incentive for applicants to apply for positions in the building department. She maintained that not much of an effort had been made by the town to lure prospective candidates to the

overworked office.

"I do not see that the town has made a concerted effort to advertise hiring a new part-time building inspector, so there was no immediate need to buy this vehicle," she said.

Board members Laura Walls, Franco Carucci and Warren Wiegand joined Majestic in voting to waive the procurement policy and to buy the vehicle for the building department.

"I'm very much in favor of getting a vehicle," Walls said. "I think it's a positive step forward for making this job more attractive. If it doesn't work out, we can always sell it."

In other news, the board unanimously approved a mass gathering permit for Gardiner Day. It will be held October 1 at George Majestic Memorial Park.

"I'm quite happy they're attempting to get this back up and running this year," Majestic said. "It will all take place down at the park. The last couple years we've (the event) been through town and did what we could with COVID. It looks like they're getting it back to the way it used to be."

Plane crash at Skydive The Ranch in Gardiner

On August 14, at approximately 11:43 a.m. State Police from the Highland and Gardiner barracks responded to Skydive The Ranch in the town of Gardiner for a report of a single engine fixed wing airplane crash.

Investigation revealed that a 1975 Piper Cherokee Six 300 aircraft was flying from Westchester County Airport to Skydive The Ranch.

While landing at the Skydive The Ranch the pilot stated there appeared to be a braking problem and the plane would not stop. The pilot attempted to climb and attempt another landing. While ascending, the plane did not gain enough altitude and struck a cable fence at the end of the runway adjacent to Sand Hill Road. The plane crossed Sand Hill Road and traveled through a vacant lot, striking trees and rocks before coming to a complete stop on Sand Hill Road.

There were a total of four people on the plane including the pilot. The pilot and front seat passenger suffered minor injuries. No one else was injured. None of the occupants required medical attention. The FAA and NTSB were notified.

Upon arrival, officers discovered the victim, a 26 year-old male New Windsor resident, lying on the ground unconscious and unresponsive. Officers immediately began life-saving measures, including CPR.

The victim was transported to the Garnett Medical Center by Town of Wallkill Emergency Medical Services, where he was pronounced dead.

Additionally, a second victim, a 26-year-old female Middletown resident, was transported to Garnett Medical Center, where she was treated for a laceration to her right leg. A third victim, a 32-year-old Middletown male, was also treated at Garnett Medical Center.

According to witnesses, the deceased male victim was operating a motor cycle that struck the rear of a sedan. The female victim was a passenger of a second motorcycle operated by the 32 year-old that struck the rear of a pickup truck.

The investigation by Town of Wallkill Police is being assisted by the Orange County District Attorney's Office and the New York State Police.

Prior to the departure, Captain Kelly Ross and her team helped administer COVID tests to the children, collected medications, made final phone calls and collected canteen funds that would be given later to the kids once they arrived at the camp. According to Ross, the camp was free of charge and transportation was provided to and from.

"I'm just excited for the kids, they have an opportunity to go to camp," Ross said. "They're going to be swimming, they're going to be boating, they're going to be doing ropes courses and climbing the rock wall."

Parents who were still interested in sending their kids to camp and had additional questions had the opportunity to contact Ross at her office to learn more about the camp.

Agostini also wanted to offer a special thanks for the work that Captain Ross has done here in the Newburgh community through the Salvation Army. "Captain Kelly [Ross] she's been awesome. She's been amazing," Agostini said. "She helps the community and she helps the kids to make sure they have a good time."

Environmentally friendly representatives

Environmental Advocates Action (EAA) has released its annual Environmental Scorecard, which reports the environmental voting records of all New York State Senators on legislation found to have a positive or negative impact on New York's environment.

EAA notes that, this year, the Senate passed measures that protect streams and wetlands to ensure that wildlife has protected habitats and reduce solid waste by supporting recycling programs and requiring carpet manufacturers to take their products back instead of being disposed of in a landfill or burned in an incinerator.

Locally, Senator James T. Skoufis scored a 94, up one point from a year ago. According to EAA, he had one incorrect environmental vote on a bill titled "Eco-Friendly Ending." This legislation establishes a program to allow for natural organic reduction as an alternative to cemetery burial or cremation, which are currently the two options for processing human remains after death in New York.

Senator Mike Martucci earned a 71 from EAA, up from 68 a year ago. His incorrect environmental votes, according to EAA, included the "Advanced Building Codes, Appliance and Equipment Efficiency Standards Act" that establishes new criteria for updating the state building code to align it with New York's Climate Law, eliminates automatic exemptions from the code and adopts a lifecycle cost-benefit analysis for new construction and renovations to existing structures. He also reportedly voted against a bill requiring that at least 25 percent of the state's vehicle fleet are zero emission vehicles (ZEV) by 2025 and 50 percent by 2030.

Local senators voted in favor of legislation that bans use of Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in clothing, an "enhanced public participation plan" for major projects located within or adjacent to disadvantaged communities and "Green Transit," a bill that requires public transportation systems to purchase zero-emission buses and related equipment, starting in 2029.

All of these measures show a critical level of environmental awareness.

What old men count out loud when alone

As my father entered his final stage of advanced frailty, the nephews moved his bed downstairs to the library. The bed took up the center of the room and left Deb's long unused baby grand piano and the bookcases and bookshelves to surround the outer edges of the room.

The marriage beds were long gone, and he used a rope poster bed now and, unlike most beds today, it was a real piece of furniture. A rope bed has hemp ropes pulled taught side to side between the bed frame to hold up the mattress. The bed might not have been the most comfortable, but it had other advantages. The top of the mattress was of such a height that he could easily slip into and out of bed without much struggle, and when he sat up on the edge his feet just made the floor, and he could slip on his doeskin slippers without bending over.

While leaving or entering the room, touching the knob of the footboard gave tactical confirmation of the life of wood and the varnish was suitably worn and the post offered support and direction to a man legally blind. When in use, the sound of the hemp rope creaking against the wood runners as he moved

left or right must have triggered memories formed in the 1920's.

I was his favorite chef because I was the one offspring who knew how to cook and took the time to do it, and I was there at least once a week, I forget the night, mid-week certainly, probably Tuesday, to cook him a real dinner usually with stuff I grew and with a cut of meat. And so afterwards he left the kitchen and, if winterish and the world prematurely dark, he headed to the library bed while I cleaned up the dishes. It was then I would hear him begin to count and he would count out loud, quite boldly, as if he didn't know I was there and he counted "...nine, ten...fifteen, sixteen" on and on. And this was often the case.

I didn't think much of it until one day said to myself, "What the hell is he counting?"

Now I know as a regular man he liked to count and I was at a meeting with him in Middletown once and as he listened to the speakers he counted all the cement blocks along the top of the wall of the room and then counted

the number of rows stacked, and so he calculated the total number of cement blocks it took to construct this meeting hall and, knowing the price of a block, he gave me the cost of materials.

And my grandfather on my mother's side, then in his 90's, counted too -- a retired locomotive engineer -- and once I asked him, "What are you counting?" And he said, "the length of the train whistle."

I went to the door of the library and Dad was already in bed and under covers and he was counting out loud, and I interrupted him and said "Pop, what are you counting?"

"What?" he asked, looking out the window and up the lane into the thick dusk.

"What are you counting, Dad?" I repeated.

"Oh," he said, "was I counting? I don't know," he said laughing, fully laughing, not in self-pity or anything, but really laughing in the silliness of it. I didn't know if he felt the silliness of it was that he was counting out loud, or that he didn't know what he was counting. Either way, we had a good laugh.

I said, "Maybe you're counting sheep?"

"Yes," he said, "Maybe I'm counting my sheep."

"And you will soon be fast asleep."

"And I will soon be fast asleep."

The Wall That Heals coming to Middletown

The Wall That Heals, a three-quarter scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial along with a mobile Education Center, is coming to Middletown on September 15-18 at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church, 90 Euclid Ave., Middletown, and will be open 24 hours a day and free to the public. The Wall That Heals honors the more than three million Americans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces in the Vietnam War, and it bears the names of the 58,281 men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam.

"We are pleased to host this amazing memorial not only on behalf of the veterans of the Vietnam War, but of all those who have served our country. My hope is that this event will be an opportunity of healing and education for everyone in the community," said Rev. Paul A.M. Denault, O.Carm. Pastor, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish

"The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund is pleased to bring The Wall That Heals mobile exhibit to Middletown to allow local veterans and their family members a chance to experience The Wall," said Jim Knotts, president and CEO of VVMF. "Hosting The Wall That Heals provides an opportunity to honor and remember all those who served and sacrificed in the Vietnam War and educate visitors on the continuing impact of the Vietnam War on America."

VVMF will work closely with each community to maintain and exceed health and safety standards as established by the appropriate federal, state and local authorities.

"Nothing is more important to VVMF than the health and well-being of our

Vietnam veterans and their families. We will work closely with the host to provide the best visitor experience while keeping the safety of our staff, volunteers and visitors at top of mind," said Knotts.

The Wall That Heals is transported from community to community in a 53-foot trailer. When parked, the trailer opens with exhibits built into its sides, allowing it to serve as a mobile Education Center telling the story of the Vietnam War, The Wall and the divisive era in American history.

The three-quarter scale Wall replica

is 375 feet in length and stands 7.5 feet high at its tallest point. Visitors will experience The Wall rising above them as they walk towards the apex, a key feature of the design of The Wall in D.C. Visitors are able to do name rubbings of individual service members' names on The Wall.

The mobile Education Center exhibit includes: digital photo displays of "Hometown Heroes," service members whose names are on The Wall that list their home of record within the area of a visit; digital photo displays of Vietnam veterans from the local area honored through VVMF's In Memory program which honors veterans who returned home from Vietnam and later died as a result of their service; video displays that teach about the history and impact of The Wall; educational exhibits told through items representative of those left at The Wall in D.C.; a replica of the In Memory plaque; a map of Vietnam and a chronological overview of the Vietnam War. The exhibits tell the story of the Vietnam War, The Wall and the era surrounding the conflict, and are designed to put American experiences

in Vietnam in a historical and cultural context.

The 2022 national The Wall That Heals tour is generously sponsored by USAA. Through a partnership with the Truckload Carriers Association (TCA), the trucking industry and Blue Beacon, the exhibit is able to travel across the country. Also, many thanks to lead sponsor Orange and Rockland Utilities.

Since its debut in 1996, the exhibit has been on display in nearly 700 U.S. communities, in addition to an April 1999 tour of the Four Provinces of Ireland and a visit to Canada in 2005. The Wall That Heals is a program of VVMF, the nonprofit organization that built the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. in 1982. The Wall That Heals is the only traveling exhibit affiliated with The Wall in Washington, D.C. and includes the largest Wall replica that travels the country. 

SNAP/TANF/FDPIR Households:

Households that currently include children who receive the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) but who are not found during the Direct Certification Matching Process (DCMP), or households that currently receive Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) must complete an application listing the child's name, a valid SNAP, TANF, or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member. Eligibility for free meal benefits based on participation in SNAP, TANF or FDPIR is extended to all children in the household. When known to the School Food Authority, households will be notified of their children's eligibility for free meals based on their participation in the SNAP, TANF or the FDPIR programs. No application is necessary if the household was notified by the SFA their children have been directly certified. If the household is not sure if their children have been directly certified, the household should contact the school.

Other Source Categorical Eligibility: When known to the School Food Authority, households will be notified of any child's eligibility for free meals based on the

individual child's designation as Other Source Categorically Eligible, as defined by law. Children are determined Other Source Categorically Eligible if they are Homeless, Migrant, Runaway, A foster child, or Enrolled in Head Start or an eligible pre-kindergarten program.

If children or households receive benefits under Assistance Programs or Other Source Categorically Eligible Programs and are not listed on the notice of eligibility and are not notified by the School Food Authority of their free meal benefits, the parent or guardian should contact the school or should submit an income application.

Other Households: Households with income the same or below the amounts listed above for family size may be eligible for and are urged to apply for free and/or reduced price meals (or free milk). They may do so by completing the application sent home with the letter to parents. One application for all children in the household should be submitted. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year to Tracey Rohl. Please contact Tracey at 845-895-7105 with any questions regarding the application process.

Households notified of their children's eligibility must contact the School Food Authority if they choose to decline the free meal benefits. Households may apply for benefits at any time throughout the school year. Children of parents or guardians who become unemployed or experience a financial hardship mid-year may become eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk at any point during the school year.

For up to 30 operating days into the new school year (or until a new eligibility determination is made, whichever comes first), an individual child's free or reduced price eligibility status from the previous year will continue within the same SFA. When the carryover period ends, unless the household is notified that their children are directly certified or the household submits an application that is approved, the children's meals must be claimed at the paid rate. Though encouraged to do so, the SFA is not required to send a reminder or a notice of expired eligibility.

The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used for determining eligibility. The names and eligibility status of participants may also be used for the allocation of funds to federal education programs such as Title I and National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), State health or State education programs, provided the State agency or local education agency administers the programs, and for federal, State or local means-tested nutrition programs with eligibility standards comparable to the NSLP. Eligibility information may also be released to programs authorized under the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) or the Child Nutrition Act (CNA). The release of information to any program or entity not specifically authorized by the NSLA will require a written consent statement from the parent or guardian.

The School Food Authority does, however, have the right to verify at any time during the school year the information on the application. If a parent does not give the school this information, the child/children will no longer be able to receive free or reduced price meals (free milk).

Foster children are eligible for free meal benefits. A separate application for a foster child is no longer necessary. Foster children may be listed on the application as a member of the family where they reside. Applications must include the foster child's name and personal use income.

Under the provisions of the policy, the designated official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the designated official, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Brian Devincenzi, Assistant Superintendent, whose address is 1500 Route 208, Wallkill, NY 12589, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. However, prior to initiating the hearing procedure, the parent or School Food Authority may request a conference to provide an opportunity for the parent and official to discuss the

situation, present information and obtain an explanation of the data submitted in the application or the decisions rendered. The request for a conference shall not in any way prejudice or diminish the right to a fair hearing.

Only complete applications can be approved. This includes complete and accurate information regarding: the SNAP, TANF, or FDPIR case number; the names of all household members; on an income application, the last four digits of the social security number of the person who signs the form or an indication that the adult does not have one, and the amount and source of income received by each household member. In addition, the parent or guardian must sign the application form, certifying the information is true and correct.

Beginning July 1, 2019, students in New York State that are approved for reduced price meals will receive breakfast and lunch meals at no charge.





of Corrections, worked in the Office of Children and Family Services, St. John Bosco Child and Family Services and McQuade Children's Services. In addition, she is a New York State Certified Special Education teacher and literacy teacher who holds certifications in other areas at building and district levels.

"The roles that Steve and Nancy will take on will complement each other and are critical to a healthy learning environment. (The positions are) so critical that they will report directly to the Superintendent," said Bond.

Bond expressed his sincere thanks to all parties working together to make the proposed plan come to fruition.

Town of Montgomery Mayor Brian Maher said the municipality is prepared to provide officers for the

seven schools in the district (Valley Central High School, Middle School, Berea Elementary, East Coldenham Elementary, Walden Elementary, Montgomery Elementary and ALC at Maybrook). In addition, he shared that the town will respect whatever decision the school district makes with the other municipalities with regard to preference to have their own officers in their neighborhood schools.

The Newburgh Town Board tabled

a planned discussion of an inter-municipal agreement with the Town of Montgomery that was scheduled for Monday, August 8, and is expected to consider the proposal at a work session later this month. In June, Town of Newburgh Supervisor Gil Piaquadio expressed to the Wallkill Valley Times that he was open to suggestions that would improve school security.

were any unique trees on the site and noted the plans made no mention of the nearby historic site.

"There are some Osage orange trees on this property," replied Rose Pennings who asked if an archaeological study had been conducted.

Planning Board chairman Fred Reichle suggested the property needed "fairly significant landscaping," given its location in the town.

"It's kind of a billboard for our town," added John Brown.

Neelytown Business Park

Concerns were also raised about another project being built on spec. The Neelytown Business Park is a commercial three-lot subdivision at the intersection of Neelytown and Beaver Dam Roads. The project is a proposed 664,200 SF warehouse distribution facility and separate 214,000 SF and 250,070 warehouse distribution facilities with attendant parking, utilities and stormwater management facilities on seven existing tax parcels consisting of approximately 111.47 acres at 296 Neelytown Road and Beaver Dam Road.

Zahakos wondered how the tenants of the

warehouses would be able to attract employees.

"Other warehouses are having a problem to sustain themselves," she said. "I'm not thinking they're coming from Montgomery proper. You're one of a multitude."

She also noted that the Beaver Dam aquifer is on the property. The town board has been asked, but has not yet acted on the request, to declare the area a Critical Environmental Area that could potentially impact future development.

Despite these concerns, the planning board adopted a conditional scope for the project. Further review of the project will come at the next town planning board meeting.

Wallkill's young triathlete heads to Germany

Andie Psilopoulos has never traveled outside of North America.

She will get that opportunity in 11 months, as the 16-year-old Psilopoulos, a rising junior at Wallkill Senior High School, will represent the U.S. in Hamburg, Germany, in the triathlon in the 19-and-younger age group after finishing seventh at the age-group nationals on Aug. 6 in West Chester, OH.

"It was exciting," Psilopoulos said. "I didn't think I was going to make it this year because I'm still one of the younger ones. My age group is 15-19, and I was hoping to get a roll-down spot."

The top 8 finishers qualify for the World Triathlon Spring & Relay championships, scheduled for Hamburg from July 13-16, the next 10 competitors up until 18th place earn roll-down spots. In the event a competitor doesn't accept their berth in the World meet, the next person until 18th place will be offered the spot.

It took a little bit of time for Psilopoulos to realize she qualified for Worlds because thunderstorms in the area on triathlon day caused the event to get off to a rolling start, and not everyone in her age group started

at the same time. That prevented her from having an idea of her standing, despite being one of the first athletes in her age group to finish.

"It was different," Psilopoulos said. "That was my first time having a start that way. It was kind of interesting. You had to just push yourself and try to catch the people that weren't in your age group and try to race with them, even though it didn't really matter if you beat them or not."

The start of the triathlon plays to one of Psilopoulos' strengths as swimming is her strongest event, and she called the first leg of the race one of the best swims she's ever had, passing several athletes in her age group.

"I was happy with my swim and going into the bike, my weakest, I knew I really had to push the bike to try to

stay where I was," Psilopoulos.

And push it, she did, and she said she was tired coming off the bike and into the run, but with two events behind her, she knew she was almost done.

It was about 15 minutes between the time Psilopoulos finished the event and the results were announced. However, it wasn't an immediate concern.

"I was still really tired from the race, and I was just sitting there trying to recover, and cool down," Psilopoulos said.

And then came the surprise. She finished seventh, getting that automatic berth at the Worlds meet, and not the roll-down spot she was expecting.

"I was really happy," Psilopoulos said. "I was kind of surprised like I really didn't believe I did it."

That's not all she did that weekend.

The day before the triathlon, she swam in the open water swim. The previous week, she went to the age-group nationals in Milwaukee, where she was 25th on July 30. The next day, she participated in the mixed-team relay – two boys, two girls – and her team finished third.

It's not an easy event, but she enjoys the varied activity and the challenge.

"I like training the three different things because it breaks it up and makes it more enjoyable and fun," Psilopoulos said. "I've also liked the longer races that are just not done in a minute. It takes a while."
